NOTES:

Nyika Crocodile Farm is doing very well. They have not exported skins for a long time because their buyers want bigger size skins. Ngabu and Chiwale Farms are progressing well. They experienced high mortalities of hatchlings in 2008 due to very cold winter weather. This has improved since. The two farms will start exporting in 2011 when the oldest stocks will be over three years. Koma Croc Farm has been doing poorly ever since. They would show some progress especially in feeding, for a few months and condition fall afterwards. The Department is trying to see if they can combine with another company to properly manage the stock.

Regarding release of live young crocodiles to the wild, communities are very much against it. It has therefore been resolved that farmers should give 5% of their surviving crocodiles from wild eggs to National Parks and Wildlife (converted into money at average skin value) for sensitisation campaigns in crocodile areas, especially where people are in the habit of destroying crocodile eggs. The programme will start towards end of this year (2010).

All crocodile farms have been authorised to capture 30 per year each adult live crocodiles for five years, so that they do not depend on wild eggs after the period. This is a long term management toolkit in crocodile conservation. Meanwhile, each farm has a five year permit (starting 2009) to collect 5,000 eggs from the wild.
