Annex 6: Explanation of Each Budget Line

- 2. The Secretariat would like to provide the Parties with the following explanations:
 - a) The first portion of the budget (Basic Budget) deals with the very basic needs of the Secretariat, as established at previous meetings. The increase to the biennium 1986/87 results solely from fluctuations in the rate of exchange of the US dollar (SFr. 2.64 for US\$ 1.— at the time of adoption of the budget in Buenos Aires compared with SFr. 1.50 for US\$ 1.— now). It represents the continuation of the Budget approved in Buenos Aires.
 - b) The second portion of the budget (Additional Needs) deals with specific tasks which have been requested by Parties to the Convention or by Resolutions of the Conference of the Parties. This represents an additional input of US\$ 660,000 for the biennium.
 - c) The combined total takes into account both the basic and the additional needs.
- 3. The Secretariat has prepared two tables of contributions (Annexes 2 and 3), one dealing with the budget established for the basic needs and one for the basic and additional needs. However, it should be noted that an amount of US\$ 350,000 has been added to both budget figures to cover for the loss in 1986 and 1987 of the reserves which we had built up by the end of 1985.

The Trust Fund was able to build up a reserve of about US\$ 350,000 by the end of 1985 to finance the first six months expenditure of 1986. However, the recent decline in the value of the U.S. dollar has led to an increase in expenditure in U.S. dollar terms and, by the end of 1986, the reserve to finance 1987 expenditure had been reduced to less than US\$ 200,000 and will be totally used up by the end of 1987, creating a serious problem of liquidity.

While it might be possible to find mechanisms to alleviate this problem of liquidity for the beginning of 1988, Parties have to accept the responsibility for years to come.

- 4. Annex 6 to document Doc. 6.11 represents explanations and details of each of the budget lines.
- 5. The Secretariat recommends that the Parties consider the establishment of a minimum contribution of US\$ 1,000.- per annum.
- 6. The Secretariat also recommends that a Budget Committee be established at the very beginning of the 6th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to analyze the budget proposal of the Secretariat and to make recommendations to both Committee II and the Conference of the Parties.

1. Professional Posts: (Additional Needs)

a) Enforcement Officer

General Recommendations [arising from the Enforcement Seminar held in Bristol (U.K.) from 29 September to 5 October 1986]

The following points form the framework for a proposed strategy to enable CITES Party states to improve their individual CITES enforcement activities and their ability to co-operate internationally in the pursuit of CITES' objectives....

^{**} Admin. Assistant: Provided by UNEP against the administrative costs.

The Secretariat should co-ordinate these activities and should provide enforcement agencies, via Management Authorities where appropriate, with relevant information, including, where possible, names of persons convicted, and the analysis of information collected. To enable the Secretariat to fulfil this function, additional staff should be taken on.

b) Plant Officer

Several Parties to the Convention, including Hungary, the Netherlands and the United States of America, as well as several NGOs have been constantly calling more attention to be paid by CITES to the plants. This can only be achieved by the hiring of a plant specialist within the CITES Secretariat to co-ordinate this activity.

c) Special Project Co-ordinator

For 1986 and 1987, the Japanese Government has seconded to the Secretariat the officer responsible for this activity. There is a strong possibility of extension of this secondment arrangement until 1 November 1988. However, as of that date, this post will have to be covered by the regular budget of the Conference of the Parties.

Budget Line 12 Consultants

12.02 Public Awareness: Currently, all efforts in this area are being undertaken by a consultant funded by UNEP.

12.03 CITES News: It is planned to have 4 issues a year. A consultant will be needed for editorial work.

Budget Line 13 Support Services

13.02 Translators: Due to considerable pressure on the regular staff, this work will now have to be undertaken, from time to time as work accumulates, by temporary staff.

13.03 Conference Servicing Staff: 12 interpreters, 7 translators, 2 rapporteurs, salary and travel costs.

Dear Mr. Secretary General,

As you know, the IUCN Environmental Law Centre has, over the past ten years, developed a data bank on animal species dealt with in legislation. This data bank has been created mainly for CITES purposes, although there are many other useful aspects to it.

Each piece of legislation dealing with fauna species specifically has been analysed for the species considered; this has resulted in the indexation of over 1500 legal texts from all over the world, and the entry in the data bank of over 10,000 animal taxa so far.

We have been financially assisted in this task by contributions from the World Wildlife Fund International over many years; CITES has also included in its budget a small contribution toward the cost of this undertaking (8000 DM per year).

We have now a considerable amount of data stored in the ELIS data bank of the IUCN on this subject. The data so far available have attracted the interest of several governments Party to CITES, including the United States, Denmark, France, and Germany. The German Department of Nature Conservation of the Ministry of the Environment has even contracted with us for the development of a similar data bank on flora protection in 29 European countries.

This demonstrates the value of the data so far stored.

We would like to make this data bank available world-wide, maintain it on a permanent basis and enlarge it for the benefit of CITES management authorities and other users. In order to do this, we consider that financial support in the order of 150,000 DM per year for at least a period of four years is needed.
