REPORT OF THE CHAIR

1. This document has been submitted by Ms. Carolina Caceres as representative of Canada, Chair of the Standing Committee.*

Background

2. Canada was elected as Chair by the Members of the Standing Committee at its 68th meeting (SC68, Johannesburg, October 2016), following the 17th meeting of the Conference of the Parties (CoP17, Johannesburg, 2016). China was at the same meeting elected to serve as Vice-Chair. These Parties continued to fill the posts concerned during the intersessional periods between the 17th and 18th meeting of the Conference of the Parties (CoP17, Johannesburg, 2016) and the present meeting.

Summary of the Committee's workload between CoP18 and CoP19

- 3. The Committee held three meetings since CoP18: the 72nd meeting (SC72, Geneva, August 2019) was held in August 2019 in Geneva, immediately after CoP18. The 73rd meeting (SC73, online, May 2021) took place online, the first online meeting of a CITES Committee, due to concerns related to the health and safety of participants, sanitary measures, border controls and travel restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic. A few matters were also finalized intersessionally through the procedure for intersessional decision-making provided for in Rule 20 of the Rules of Procedures of the Standing Committee. The 74th meeting (SC74, Lyon, March 2022) was held in Lyon, France in March 2022. The 75th meeting (SC75) is scheduled to take place in Panama City, Panama on 13 November 2022, immediately prior to the present meeting.
- 4. The Standing Committee meetings continue to be characterized by an unprecedented and increasing volume of work for the Committee. The 74th meeting of the Standing Committee (SC74, Lyon, March 2022) agenda included 89 items, found in 117 documents. Concluding this ambitious agenda was only possible with the inclusion of evening sessions throughout the duration of the meeting, made possible with the generous support from France.
- 5. In addition to instructions to the Committee in 29 Resolutions of the Conference of the Parties, CoP18 also directed 86 Decisions to the Standing Committee. The reporting burden of the Standing Committee continues to substantially increase at each CoP, as illustrated in **Table 1** below.

6. To fully undertake the work charged to it by the Conference of the Parties, the Standing Committee, at SC74, was required to add regular evening sessions to its programme of work and minimize the use of in-session working groups due to lack of time. The meeting was possible due to generous hosting by France; otherwise not possible in the context of the agreed budget. This precedent was set at SC70, and at current rate of growth, is a necessity if Parties wish to prioritize the addressing of all SC Decisions by virtue of face-to-face meetings. Additionally, with the growing agenda comes growing costs for translation. The Parties may wish to consider these associated costs when determining the budget for SC meetings.

Activities undertaken by the Chair pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP)

- 7. The Standing Committee Chair reported on her meeting of 1 December 2020 with Ms. Inger Andersen, Executive Director of UNEP, to the Standing Committee via email. The meeting was requested to informally review the areas of cooperation outlined in the MoU between the Standing Committee and UNEP. Of note, Programme Support Costs, Delegation of Authority to the Secretary-General and the programmatic collaboration between UNEP and CITES were discussed. Regarding Programme Support Costs, as Chair, I stressed that the Committee has requested information related to the use of these costs and the payment of core administrative costs by UNEP and was informed the requested details would be available for the Finance and Budget Sub-Committee. I noted the Committee would value transparency on programme support costs. Regarding the delegation of authority to the Secretary-General, as Chair, I stressed the importance Parties place on having an agile and responsive Secretariat that can meet the expectations of the COP efficiently. I requested to review the Delegation prior to its finalization, as envisioned in the Standing Committee-UNEP MoU. Finally, there was a short but excellent discussion on the positive collaboration between the CITES Secretariat and UNEP on programmatic issues (i.e. wildlife trade and zoonoses/pandemic, the UNEP Medium-Term strategy).
- 8. The Standing Committee additionally considered reports by the Secretariat and UNEP relating to administrative matters The Secretariat provided an update on the administrative changes introduced by the United Nations (UN) Secretariat and by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), in particular the most significant changes around the New Delegation of Authority Policy. Members of the Committee expressed concerns about the lack of inclusion of the Standing Committee in the development and establishment of the new Delegation of Authority Policy process, which they considered to be contrary to the terms of the MoU between UNEP and the Standing Committee, and sought clarification from the Secretariat on why the Committee was not consulted. The Chair noted that she had been provided with the document during its development but had not been given the opportunity to comment on the role of the Committee in the development of the process. UNEP explained that this Policy resulted from a harmonisation exercise that had been undertaken across all entities under the UN, including UNEP and its constituent parts such as CITES. However, as the documents are living documents, updates could be undertaken as a result of feedback that might arise from difficulties in implementing the document as it stands. The Committee and Chair were invited to consider whether there were any specific areas of concern, with any feedback provided

by the Committee presented through the appropriate channels. The Chair welcomed the opportunity for the Committee to comment and invited review of the relevant document posted on the website.

9. The Standing Committee also welcomed the audit by the by the Office of Internal Oversight services (OIOS) conducted in 2021 and requested the Secretariat to provide an update on implementation of recommendations at the 19th meeting of the Conference of the Parties (see document CoP19 Doc. 7.1).

Work undertaken between CoP18 and CoP19

- 10. A brief summary of the Committee's discharge of all the instructions from the Conference of the Parties in 29 Resolutions and 89 Decisions is found in Annex 1 to the present document. For the most substantive issues, the Committee has submitted a working document for the present meeting. This report will provide further information on the activities of the Standing Committee to fulfil actions under the Resolutions and Decisions not reported elsewhere in a working document.
- 11. The COVID-19 pandemic had an impact on the work of the Standing Committee between CoP18 and CoP19, but twenty intersessional working groups established by the Standing Committee assisted the committee in moving work forward in a constructive manner. One of these intersessional working groups, established on 6 April 2021, was tasked to consider what the role, if any, CITES could play in reducing the risk of future zoonotic disease emergence associated with international wildlife trade, and the Standing Committee's recommendations in this regard will be considered by the Conference of Parties under agenda item 23 (document CoP19 Doc. 23.1). At its 73rd meeting, the Standing Committee noted document <u>SC73</u> <u>Doc. 15</u> prepared by the Secretariat on the implications of the COVID-19 pandemic on the implementation of the Convention, specifically on national CITES authorities, governing bodies and scientific advisory committees of CITES and on the CITES Secretariat. I note that the Secretariat submitted a document in this regard for consideration by CoP19 (see document CoP19 Doc. 24).
- 12. Intersessional decisions taken by the Standing Committee included the establishment and membership of intersessional working groups (Notification to the Parties <u>No. 2020/081</u>); the adoption of recommendations made by the Committee's Finance and Budget Subcommittee (FBSC) relating to projected savings for the year 2020 and 2021 and the approval of the transfer of resources from 2020 to 2021 (Notification to the Parties <u>No. 2021/015</u>) and from 2021 to 2022 (<u>SC74 Sum. 13 (Rev. 1</u>) to cover the cost of the organization of governing bodies meetings on one-time exceptional basis; recommendations in relation to trade with the Republic of Guinea (Notification to the Parties <u>No. 2021/033</u>); the endorsement of the draft CMS-CITES Joint Work Programme 2021-2025 (<u>SC73 SR</u>), and approval of the Programme of Work for the Joint CITES-CMS African Carnivores Initiative. The Standing Committee furthermore requested the Secretariat to submit the Joint CITES-CMS African Carnivores Initiative at the 52nd meeting of the Standing Committee of the Convention on Migratory Species (Notification to the Parties <u>No. 2021/054</u>).
- 13. The Standing Committee was also requested to consider an application to register Earth Ocean Farms. S. de R.L. de C.V. (Mexico) breeding *Totoaba macdonaldi* (SC74 Doc. 59.1.1 and SC74 Doc. 59.1.2). In terms of paragraph 4 in Annex 2 to Resolution Conf. 12.10 (Rev. CoP15) on *Registration of operations that breed Appendix -I animal species in captivity for commercial purposes*, if objections to a registration is not withdrawn or the identified problem(s) not resolved, the application shall be submitted to the Standing Committee. At its 74th meeting, the Standing Committee voted on a motion to accept the application from Mexico to include *Totoaba macdonaldi*, bred by Earth Ocean Farms. S. de R.L. de C.V. in the *CITES Register of operations that breed Appendix-I animal species for commercial purposes* [SC74 Sum. 9 (Rev. 1)], taking into account the commitments made by Mexico. The motion was approved by 9 votes in favour and 5 against, with one abstention.
- 14. A key element of the mandate of the Standing Committee is to recommend compliance actions, pursuant to Resolution Conf. 14.3 (Rev. CoP18) on *CITES compliance procedures* and associated Resolutions and Decisions. Annex 2 to the present document provides a summary of compliance matters resulting in a recommendation to suspend trade since CoP18. These recommendations arose as a result of the application of Article XIII, of Resolution Conf. 12.8 (Rev. CoP18) on the *Review of significant trade in specimens of Appendix-II species* (linked to obligations under Article IV of the Convention), of Resolution Conf. 11.17 (Rev. CoP18) on *National reports* (linked to obligations under Article VII) and Resolution Conf. 8.4 (Rev. CoP15) on *National laws for the implementation of the Convention* (linked to obligations under Article VIII and IX of the Convention). The Standing Committee also considered appropriate measures in accordance with Resolution Conf. 14.3 (Rev. CoP18) on *CITES compliance procedures* to ensure compliance with the National Ivory Action Plan process. Details relating to the measures adopted are found in document <u>SC74 Sum. 4 (Rev. 1)</u> and in the relevant CoP19 documents.

- 15. The role and responsibilities of the Standing Committee in conducting the Review of Significant Trade (RST) in specimens of Appendix-II species are described in paragraph 1 k) to p) and paragraph 2 of Resolution Conf. 12.8 (Rev. CoP18) on *Review of Significant Trade in specimens of Appendix-II species*. In addition to its impact for Parties implementing recommendations in-country, the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the RST process. As required by paragraph 1 a) of Resolution Conf. 12.8 (Rev. CoP18), the Secretariat commissioned the preparation of a post-CoP18 summary of reported trade in specimens of Appendix-II species of <u>fauna</u> and <u>flora</u> in recent years for consideration at the 31st meeting of the Animals Committee (AC31) and 25th meeting of the Plants Committee (PC25) which had been planned for July 2020. These meetings were postponed and subsequently took place online in June 2021. As a consequence, a regular RST has not been undertaken during the intersessional period between CoP18 and CoP19. The Standing Committee therefore considered species/country combinations selected for review prior to CoP18, but for which the review has not yet been completed in document <u>SC74 Doc. 30.1</u> and its <u>Addendum</u>. The details relating to the recommendations adopted by SC74 is contained in the Summary Record of the meeting (SC74 SR).
- 16. In terms of paragraph 1 and 3 of Resolution Conf. 11.17 (Rev. CoP18) on National reports, the Standing Committee must concur with amendments to the guidelines for the preparation and submission of CITES annual reports and annual illegal trade reports. The Standing Committee approved the revised Guidelines for the preparation and submission of CITES annual reports, including the revisions to the Spanish version proposed, and the revised Guidelines for the preparation and submission of "elephant" in the explanation section for tusk (raw ivory) in both Guidelines. The Committee further noted the intention of the Secretariat to propose to the Conference of the Parties revisions to Resolution Conf. 4.6 (Rev. CoP18) on Submission of draft resolutions and other documents for meetings of the Conference of the Parties and Resolution Conf. 11.17 (Rev. CoP18) on National reports contained in document CoP19 Doc. 26. The Committee invited the Secretariat to consider if further revisions of the Guidelines are needed.
- 17. Species specific matters addressed by the Standing Committee included, among others, Great apes (Hominidae spp.) and Tibetan antelope (*Pantholops hodgsonii*) [(SC74 Sum. 12 (Rev. 1)(11/03/2022)]. At its 74th meeting, the Standing Committee considered a report (SC74 Doc. 71) prepared by the Secretariat in consultation with the Great Apes Survival Partnership (GRASP) and the Primate Specialist Group Section on Great Apes (SGA) of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) in terms of <u>Resolution Conf. 13.4 (Rev. CoP18) on Conservation of and trade in great apes</u>. The Committee noted the importance of including the conservation of great apes in any collaboration with other Multilateral Environmental Agreements as part of the broader work on partnership and synergies.
- 18. The Standing Committee considered a report by the Secretariat developed in terms of <u>Resolution Conf. 11.8</u> (Rev. CoP17) on Conservation of and control of trade in the Tibetan antelope at its 74th meeting. The Committee encouraged Parties affected by illegal trade in specimens of Tibetan antelope (Pantholops hodgsonii) to continue to approach the CITES Management Authority of Switzerland for assistance with identification methods and exchange of information and knowledge about this topic. India and Italy were encouraged to enhance efforts to strengthen the capacity of its border officials concerning the identification of Tibetan antelope specimens, in particular garments and cloth, including by drawing upon the support available from Switzerland, as appropriate [(SC74 Sum. 12 (Rev. 1)(11/03/2022)].

Implementation of Decisions directed to the Standing Committee

- 19. As indicated above, a brief summary of the Committee's discharge of all the instructions from the Conference of the Parties in 29 Resolutions and 86 Decisions is found in Annex 1 to the present document. A number of decisions are discussed in the following paragraphs and these relate to decisions that requested the Standing Committee to address and conclude specific matters in line with its terms of reference (<u>Resolution Conf. 18.2</u>), including the consideration and approval of guidance documents, providing advice to the Secretariat, and recommending the deletion or renewal of specific Decisions to the Conference of Parties.
- 20. Pursuant to <u>Decision 18.2 and 18.3 on Conduct of Committees</u>, the Standing Committee did not consider whether the terms of reference of the Standing Committee Finance and Budget Subcommittee should be annexed to Resolution Conf. 18.2 on *Establishment of committees* (Decision 18.2), but it did endorse the *Guidance for chairs of CITES working groups established by the Standing Committee*, *Animals Committee* and *Plants Committee* at its 73rd meeting (<u>SC73 SR</u>) and the guidance document has been made available on the CITES website. The Chair of the Standing Committee recommends that the CoP consider the renewal of Decision 18.2 (Annex 3) and the deletion of Decision 18.3.

- 21. On the Review of the Convention (Decision 18.27), the Standing Committee agreed that there was no need for a targeted review of the implementation of the Convention at this time, in consideration of the cost implications of such a review and of the existence of other review mechanisms already agreed by the Conference of Parties [SC74 Sum. 3 (Rev. 1)]. It is therefore recommended that the CoP consider the deletion of Decision 18.27.
- 22. With regards to <u>Decision 18.38 on *World Wildlife Day*</u> that directed the Standing Committee to designate a World Wildlife Day to be focussed on livelihoods of indigenous peoples and rural and local communities; the theme for the celebration of World Wildlife Day in 2021 was "<u>Forest and Livelihoods: Sustaining People and Planet</u>".
- 23. With regards to the Decisions on the Cooperation with the World Heritage Convention (Decisions 18.52 to 18.54), the Standing Committee provided recommendations to the Secretariat for consideration in finalising the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the Secretariat and UNESCO World Heritage Centre. The MoU will provide a framework of cooperation and understanding and facilitate collaboration to further shared goals and objectives in regard to the protection of the cultural and natural heritage of outstanding universal value and of certain species of wild fauna and flora against over-exploitation through international trade. It is recommended that the CoP consider the deletion of Decisions 18.52 to 18.54.
- 24. The Secretariat informed SC74 that since the adoption of the amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP18 on *Permits and certificates* and Resolution Conf. 13.6 (Rev. CoP18) on *Implementation of Article VII, paragraph 2, concerning 'pre-Convention' specimens,* it has not received any questions or requests for additional guidance relating to the period of transition, including the period between the adoption of a proposal to transfer a species from one Appendix to another and the entry into force of the new listing. The Standing Committee agreed at SC74 to propose to CoP19 the renewal of <u>Decision 18.151</u> on the *Implications of the transfer of a species from one Appendix to another* (Annex 4) [SC74 Sum.13 (Rev. 1)].
- 25. The Standing Committee, with the assistance of the Secretariat, reviewed the existing provisions agreed by the Parties concerning controls on stocks of specimens of CITES-listed species as required in terms of <u>Decision 17.170 (Rev. CoP18)</u> on *Stocks and stockpiles*. Document <u>SC74 Doc. 60</u> on *Stocks and stockpiles* reflected on existing challenges to the implementation of CITES provisions on stocks and stockpiles; on the fundamental objectives of conservation and enforcement that should direct the management of stocks and stockpiles; and on the need for, and possible definition of, the terms "stock" and "stockpile". The financial cost of maintaining the security and integrity of stockpiles was identified as a major challenge, with existing provisions appearing to encourage retention and management of stocks and stockpiles rather than their destruction. It was also highlighted that a fundamental objective was to ensure that existing stocks and stockpiles are secured and managed in such a way that specimens do not enter illegal trade. The Standing Committee was not able to fully complete the tasks directed to it [SC74 Sum. 12 (Rev. 1)]. The Standing Committee Chair and the Secretariat were requested to revise Decision 17.170 (Rev. CoP18) and propose its adoption to CoP19 (Annex 4).
- 26. The Secretariat reported to SC74 on the implementation of <u>Decision 17.102</u> on *Captive bred and ranched specimens* (<u>SC74 Doc. 55</u>). The Standing Committee encouraged Parties to make use of the mobile app developed for determining the correct source codes for specimens, as well as undertaking inspections of captive breeding and ranching facilities and evaluating compliance of those facilities with the requirements of the Convention. The Committee also encourage Parties to provide feedback on its usefulness to the Secretariat or directly through the feedback button in the app. The Committee requested the Secretariat to invite the Animals Committee to review the app and provide feedback.
- 27. With regards to <u>Decision 18.171 on Simplified procedures for permits and certificates</u> the Standing Committee at its 73rd meeting endorsed Guidance on the use of the scientific exchange exemption and the simplified procedures to issue permits and certificates (<u>SC73 SR</u>) that has been made available on the CITES website. The Chair of the Standing Committee thus recommends deletion of Decision 18.171. At SC74, the Committee agreed to submit to CoP19 a decision to provide for a process to consider the need for the development of mechanisms to allow for the rapid movement of wildlife diagnostic samples in the interest of addressing emerging human and wildlife disease risks [<u>SC74 Sum.11 (10/03/2022)</u>]. The decision to be considered by CoP19 is contained in Annex 5 of this present document.
- Concerning precious corals (Order Antipatharia and Family Coralliidae) [Decision 17.193 (Rev. CoP18)], the Standing Committee considered the information and recommendations of the Animals Committee, made in accordance with Decision 17.192 (Rev. CoP18) and presented to the Standing Committee in document <u>SC74</u> <u>Doc. 65</u>. The Standing Committee agree to submit to CoP19 the recommendations of the Animals

Committee in paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 in Annex 2 to document AC31 Doc. 23 Addendum in its report to CoP19 (contained in Annex 6 to this present document).

- 29. With regards to the helmeted hornbill (*Rhinoplax vigil*), the Standing Committee noted document <u>SC74 Doc.</u> <u>77</u> on the implementation of <u>Decisions 18.266 to 18.268</u> and [(<u>SC74 Sum. 12 (Rev. 1)(11/03/2022</u>)], recalled paragraph 2 of <u>Resolution Conf. 17.11 on Conservation of, and trade in, helmeted hornbill</u> and encouraged range States to respond to the Secretariat's invitation to provide assistance in their implementation of that Resolution. The Standing Committee furthermore encouraged relevant range, transit and consumer States to actively take part in the INTERPOL-led meeting of a Regional Investigative and Analytical Case Management on illegal trade in helmeted hornbill, expected to be held in 2022. The Standing Committee Chair recommends that the Conference of Parties delete Decisions 18.266 to 18.269.
- The Standing Committee noted the outcomes from AC31 and PC25 joint sessions that required inputs from the Standing Committee (paragraphs 24 to 40 in document <u>SC 74 Doc. 6</u>); and agreed to the submission of several draft decisions to CoP19 [<u>SC74 Sum. 3 (Rev. 1) (08/03/2022</u>)] as identified in Annex 1 to the present document.

Other matters considered by the Standing Committee

- 31. The Standing Committee considered a document prepared by the Secretariat on the reservations entered after the 18th meeting of the Conference of Parties and the practical legal questions that have arisen in relation to the update of references to the Resolutions in the new Appendices that the Secretariat published after CoP18 (SC74 Doc. 86). The Committee welcomed the intention of the Secretariat to submit a document with recommendations for the consideration of CoP19 and invited Parties to send their comments in writing to the Secretariat. The Committee further invited the Secretariat to take these comments into account in its document to CoP19 (CoP19 Doc. 88: Communications concerning amendments to the Appendices received by the Depositary Government after the 18th meeting of the Conference of the Parties).
- 32. Concerns relating to the illegal trade in live cheetahs were raised at SC74 (SC74 Doc. 62). The Committee noted with appreciation the document that contained the concerns in this regard and expressed its concern about the ongoing illegal trade in cheetahs. The Committee invited Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia and Yemen, as well as other interested Parties, to submit to CoP19 draft decisions on illegal trade in cheetahs. Ethiopia acknowledged that, in the future, several matters relating to cheetah can be addressed through the CITES Big Cats Task Force and the African Carnivores Initiative; however, Ethiopia argued that any actions taken through the task force may come too late to save affected cheetah populations.
- 33. The report of the Chairs of the Animals and Plants Committee to SC74 (<u>SC 74 Doc. 6</u>) addressed the matter of benefits and impacts of higher taxon listings in the Appendices and the Standing Committee agreed to propose the decision in Annex 5 to the present document for consideration by CoP19 [<u>SC74 Sum. 3 (Rev. 1) (08/03/2022</u>), directing the Animals and Plants Committees to review the impact of existing and future higher taxon listings in the Appendices and to propose further guidance and recommendations to the Standing Committee.
- 34. The Standing Committee considered document <u>SC74 Doc. 15</u> on *Towards a resolution on CITES and forests*, which sets out two options retained by the Plants Committee for progressing the development of a resolution on CITES and forests. The Secretariat noted its support for Option 1 (for the draft resolution on CITES and forests prepared by the Secretariat to be submitted for consideration at CoP19), which in its view was considered to be most coherent with the need to urgently act upon the objectives set out in the draft resolution. Option 2 proposed draft decisions for developing a strategic resolution on *CITES and forests* during the CoP19-CoP20 intersessional period, and to allow consideration of the benefit of pursuing such a strategic resolution. SC74 noted the importance of forests and of trade in tree species and agreed that it was premature to submit a resolution on CITES and forests (SC74 SR). The Committee recommended that the Secretariat submit draft decisions to the Conference of the Parties that would ensure that the Plants and Standing Committees are involved in the development of any resolution on CITES and forests. The Committee further recommended that the Secretariat consider the points raised by Canada on behalf of the North American region in information document S74 Inf. 21, including activities it could implement during the intersessional period after CoP19 in working towards a resolution.
- 35. The Standing Committee furthermore approved the *CITES guidelines for the non-air transport of live animals* and plants as set out in the Annex to document <u>SC74 Doc. 45</u>. The Committee also requested the Secretariat to consider, in consultation with the International Air Transport Association (IATA), options to improve access to the IATA Live Animals Regulations, and to report to the Standing Committee at SC77.

- 36. The Standing Committee noted the implementation by the Secretariat of the recommendations of the Animals Committee reported on in document <u>SC74 Doc. 47</u> on the *Identification and traceability of sturgeons and paddlefishes (Acipenseriformes spp.)* [SC74 Sum. 12 (Rev. 1) (11/03/2022)]. The Committee requested the Secretariat to publish the list of laboratories and the summary table Table 2 of the study on *Identification of species, subspecies, source and origin of sturgeons and paddlefish species and specimens (Acipensiformes spp.) in trade* on the CITES website and to share the study with the International Consortium on Combating Wildlife Crime to support enforcement agencies in detecting illegal trade in sturgeon and paddlefish specimens. The Committee further invited Parties to make use of the identification methods described in the study and agreed that Decisions 16.136 (Rev. CoP18) to 16.138 (Rev. CoP18) have been implemented. The Chair recommends the deletion of these Decisions.
- 37. The Standing Committee reviewed the draft guidance prepared by the Secretariat relating to the publication of the Appendices (SC74 Doc. 85). The aim of the guidance was to support the Secretariat in publishing the Appendices and assist those Parties that incorporate the amendments to the Appendices directly into their national legislation. The Committee invited the Secretariat to take into account the comments made by Canada, China, Israel and Poland as it finalizes the draft Guidance for the publication of the Appendices before its publication on the CITES website. The Committee noted the issues outlined in document SC74 Doc. 85, inter alia the possibility of harmonizing references to "zero quotas" in the Appendices and of including higher taxa listings in accordance with Annex 3 to Resolution Conf. 9.24 (Rev. CoP17) on Criteria for amendment of Appendices I and II. The Secretariat indicated that these aspects will be addressed through the proposed draft decisions on higher taxon listings in the Appendices in paragraph 33 of the present document, as well as the mechanism and information system for the review of existing and proposed annotations (CoP19 Doc. 85.3). The Standing Committee agreed to propose to CoP19 the insertion of a sub-paragraph in Resolution Conf. 4.6 (Rev. CoP18) on Submission of draft resolutions and other documents for meetings of the Conference of the Parties to provide for the amendment of the guidance by the Standing Committee. The Secretariat included this proposed amendment in the document on the Review of Resolutions (CoP19 Doc. 26)

Reflections of the Chair

38. As I have noted in past, and it bears repeating, international trade in wild fauna and flora has grown increasingly complex. We have seen changing patterns of global trade with new or increased demand for various wildlife products, shifts from wild to non-wild sources, emerging biotechnologies and new web-based methods for engaging in international trade. The Resolutions and Decisions adopted by the Conference of the Parties reflect this complex evolution and provide opportunities for CITES to respond to these challenges. However, it has also continued to create significant growth in the demands on the Standing Committee. In this intersessional period, we were all faced with the additional challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. The traditional face-to-face meetings were curtailed, requiring creativity in order to continue to progress the 29 Resolutions and 86 Decisions directed to the Committee. The Committee experimented with increased use of the postal procedure, particularly to set up intersessional working groups, as well as formal and informal online meetings. In my personal view, these tools were useful for some of the Committee's business but could not completely replace the dialogue and common understanding achieved in a face-toface meeting. Nonetheless, I suggest experimentation should continue in the face of the ever-growing agenda. These tools can also provide new opportunities to reach Parties, stakeholders and observers who may not be able to attend physical meeting. These tools may also provide space for more in depth discussions on key issues; the current heavy agenda for the face-to-face meetings of the Committee makes it difficult to hold in session working groups where such detailed discussion might have occurred. I also continue to invite Parties to think thoughtfully and critically about the tasks they are putting before the Committees, the Secretariat and themselves. Regardless, I recognize that the ever-growing expectations of the Standing Committee reflect the continued and growing importance of CITES as a conservation and sustainable use treaty. I believe there remains a general sense of excitement around what we, collectively, have accomplished thus far and what the future holds for CITES.

Concluding remarks

39. This past intersessional period has been full of surprises, not the least of which has been the COVID-19 pandemic. My deepest sympathies to those who have lost loved ones during this challenging time, or who might still be combatting the lingering effects of this virus. As Chair for the past two intersessional period, I know that any success is due entirely to the ongoing hard work of many and that is particularly true during this past period. I want to extend my sincere gratitude firstly to the members of the Committee and observer Parties, in particular those who took on chairing intersessional working groups and thus allowed the Committee to progress its large agenda. I would like to thank all the Committee members, the Chairs of the Plants and Animals Committees, Parties, observer organizations, partners including those in other

Multilateral Environment Agreements and UN agencies, and various experts who collectively contributed to the Committee's robust decision making. I would also like to thank France for hosting the 74th meeting of the Committee – we made it to the finish line! Thank you also to Environment and Climate Change Canada for providing the resources necessary to undertake this role, to my team and colleagues for their support and to my family, especially my children for their curiosity and many many questions. Last, but far from least, my very special thanks go to the CITES Secretariat, under the leadership of Ivonne Higuero. The professional expertise and personal dedication of each member of the Secretariat team is without compare, as is their patience with my questions and demands. As I conclude my time as Chair of this Committee, I am inspired by the passion and commitment of all the people with whom I have had the honour to work. Thank you all.

Recommendations

- 40. The Conference of the Parties is invited to take note of the present document and to agree to :
 - a) delete Decisions 18.3, 18.27, 18.52 to 18.54, 18.171, 18.266 to 18.269 and 16.136 (Rev. CoP18) to 16.138 (Rev. CoP18) because these Decisions have been implemented as reported in the present document;
 - b) renew the Decision on *Conduct of the Committees* found in Annex 3 to the present document;
 - c) adopt the revised Decision on *Implications of the transfer of a species from one Appendix to another* and the revised Decision on *Stocks and stockpiles* found in Annex 4 to the present document;
 - d) adopt the Decision on *Simplified procedures* and the Decision on *Higher taxon listings* found in Annex 5 to the present document; and
 - e) note the recommendations relating to precious corals (Order Antipatharia and Family Coralliidae) in Annex 6 to the present document.

COMMENTS OF THE SECRETARIAT

- A. The Secretariat recommends that the Conference of the Parties note the report and adopt the recommendations in paragraph 40.
- B. With regards to simplified procedures, the Secretariat has received communications from stakeholders indicating that Parties are not making full use of the simplified procedures described in paragraph 22 of Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP18) on *Permits and certificates*, or the scientific exchange exemption in Article VII, paragraph 6 and Resolution Conf. 11.15 (Rev. CoP18) on *Non-commercial loan, donation or exchange of museum, herbarium, diagnostic and forensic research specimens* to facilitate and expedite processes around low risk trade, including in cases where diagnostic and biological samples are urgently required. In light of this, the Secretariat would like to encourage Parties to make full use of these provisions which have been agreed by the Conference of the Parties. To this end, in conjunction with work proposed under draft decision 19.AA on *Rapid movement of wildlife diagnostic samples in the interest of addressing emerging human and wildlife disease risks* (Annex 5 to the document), Parties may consider raising awareness of the provisions; making information relating to the relevant processes available to the public, providing training to CITES Management Authorities, if required; and reviewing national legislation, if appropriate, to ensure that simplified procedures and the scientific exchange exemption have been duly incorporated into Parties' legal frameworks.
- C. The Secretariat furthermore recommends that the language 'diagnostic purposes and/or conservation purposes' should be taken to refer to purposes that are non-commercial and that the context of a health emergency should be relevant in defining the scope of work under draft decision 19.AA. Mechanisms developed under draft decision 19.AA should be carefully considered in alignment with other applicable legal instruments which regulate the movement of genetic resources.
- D. The Secretariat will collect information from Parties through the publication of a Notification about issues impeding the swift transfer of wildlife samples for diagnostic purposes and/or conservation purposes and submit a compilation of this and other relevant information for consideration by the Standing Committee in connection with its implementation of draft decision 19.AA.

E. If further discussion on the aforementioned matters is required, the Secretariat recommends that these issues be referred to Committee II for further discussion under agenda item 23.1 on the *Role of CITES in reducing risk of future zoonotic disease emergence associated with international wildlife trade.*

CoP18) on *Permits and certificates*, to facilitate the efficient international movement of wildlife samples for diagnostic purposes and/or conservation purposes, for consideration by the 20th meeting of the Conference of the Parties.

19.AA The Animals and Plants Committees shall, taking into consideration document AC31 Doc. 38 with its Annex and its addendum, as well as the provisions of Resolution Conf. 9.24 (Rev. CoP17), Annex 3, review the impact of existing and future higher taxon listings in the Appendices and propose further guidance and recommendations as necessary, for consideration by the Standing Committee.

Directed to the Standing Committee

19.BB The Standing Committee shall take into account the guidance and recommendations from the Animals and Plants Committees and make any recommendations to the 20th meeting of the Conference of the Parties, as required.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM DOCUMENT AC31 DOC. 23 ON PRECIOUS CORALS, ADDENDUM, SUBMITTED BY THE STANDING COMMITTEE FOR CONSIDERATION BY COP19

- 1. The Animals Committee:
 - a) encourages Parties to continue to strengthen their domestic management and conservation measures concerning all precious corals; and
 - b) reminds Parties which export CITES-listed black coral species to make non-detriment findings (NDFs) and encourages these Parties to provide copies of the NDFs to the Secretariat for publication on the CITES website.
- 2. The Animals Committee:
 - a) notes the challenges of analysing trade in coral products since the current Harmonized System (HS) classification amalgamates them with other species due to the lack of specific custom codes;
 - b) further notes the cumbersome process of adopting specific custom codes on an international level;
 - c) in this light, recommends to the Standing Committee to consider the challenges posed by the lack of specific customs codes for international trade in precious corals and their parts and derivatives, when reviewing the report by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and making its recommendations, as appropriate.
 - recommends to the Secretariat to follow-up on cases of illegal trade for CITES-listed species black corals referred to in the FAO report and provide an update on their findings to the Animals Committee and Standing Committee as appropriate.
- 3. The Animals Committee notes <u>Decision 17.181</u> on the new treaty on marine biodiversity of areas beyond national jurisdiction (BBNJ) which may have relevance to CITES-listed corals and CITES Introduction from the Sea certificates.
- 4. The Animals Committee notes that there are many potential impacts on many coral populations in the wild (including climate change, ocean acidification, and others) which may affect precious coral too, which should be taken into account to understand the coral diversity within the marine environment.

TENTATIVE BUDGET AND SOURCE OF FUNDING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTIONS OR DECISIONS

According to Resolution Conf. 4.6 (Rev. CoP18) on *Submission of draft resolutions, draft decisions and other documents for meetings of the Conference of the Parties*, the Conference of the Parties decided that any draft resolutions or decisions submitted for consideration at a meeting of the Conference of the Parties that have budgetary and workload implications for the Secretariat or permanent committees must contain or be accompanied by a budget for the work involved and an indication of the source of funding. The Secretariat proposes the following tentative budget and source of funding.

The draft decisions will have workload implications for the Secretariat and the Animals, Plants and Standing Committees, but it is estimated that these can be accommodated within existing resources.
