Species specific matters

89. Proposals to amend Appendices I and II

Discussion resumed on **proposal CoP19 Prop. 4**. Zimbabwe stated that it wished to reopen debate solely on annotation 2e) relating to trade in leather goods; it wished to be included in the range States allowed to trade in leather goods for commercial or non-commercial purposes along with Botswana, South Africa and Namibia, considering that uniformity of the annotation for southern African range States would ease implementation.

The Central African Republic, Congo, Gabon, Israel, Liberia, Mali, Niger, Nigeria, Panama, Senegal and Togo opposed the proposed change, variously querying whether natural mortality would provide sufficient hides for the leather trade and stating their concern that further opening trade in leather products would incentivise hunting of younger elephants with higher quality skin.

Botswana, China, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Namibia and South Africa supported the amended proposal.

Zimbabwe called for a vote on the amended proposal. With 53 votes in favour, 48 against and 32 abstaining, the proposal to amend paragraph 2e) of the annotation to include Zimbabwe in the list of Parties allowed to trade in leather products for commercial purposes was rejected.

The Chair of Committee I reported that the Committee had rejected **proposal CoP19 Prop. 5** and an amended version of **proposal CoP19 Prop. 13**, each following a vote. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 5 and the amended version of proposal CoP19 Prop. 13 were rejected.

Having been accepted by consensus in Committee I, the following proposals were adopted: CoP19 **Prop. 6, Prop. 7, Prop. 8 (Rev. 1), Prop. 10, Prop. 15, Prop. 16 (Rev. 1), Prop. 19, Prop. 20, Prop. 22 (Rev. 1), Prop. 24, Prop. 25 (Rev. 1), Prop. 26, Prop. 27, Prop. 28 (Rev. 1), Prop. 29, Prop. 30, Prop. 31, Prop. 32, Prop. 33, Prop. 34, Prop. 35, Prop. 36 (Rev. 1), Prop. 38, Prop. 39, Prop. 43, Prop. 45, Prop. 50 and Prop. 51**. As part of consideration of proposal CoP19 Prop. 35, the standard nomenclature reference detailed in document CoP19 Com. I Rec. 14 was adopted. Regarding proposal CoP19 Prop. 51, the use of 'Plants of the World Online' as the standard nomenclatural reference for the genus *Pterocarpus* was adopted.

Proposal CoP19 Prop. 46 had been agreed after a vote in Committee I with 95 votes in favour, 12 against and 17 abstentions. Gabon, with support from the Congo, proposed debate be reopened on the proposal to remove the species *Afzelia bipindensis* from the proposal. The Democratic Republic of the Congo and other Parties opposed the proposal. The Chair proceeded to a vote: with 30 in favour, 71 opposing and 38 abstentions, the proposal to reopen debate was rejected. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 46 was adopted.

Proposal CoP19 Prop. 9 (Rev. 1), as amended to add an annotation stating “the entry into effect in the inclusion in Appendix I delayed by 12 months”, had been agreed by Committee I by consensus and was adopted.

Proposals CoP19 Prop. 11 and Prop. 12, both amended to add an annotation stating “ zero annual export quota for wild specimens traded for commercial purposes” had been agreed by Committee I by consensus and were adopted.

Proposals CoP19 Prop. 14, Prop. 23 and Prop. 40 had been accepted by Committee I following votes and were adopted. As part of consideration of proposal CoP19 Prop. 40, a number of standard nomenclatural references for the family Rhinobatidae, as detailed in section 11 of document CoP19 Prop. 40, as accepted by Committee I, were adopted.

The Chair of Committee I reported that **proposals CoP19 Prop. 17 and Prop. 18** had been considered together; proposal CoP19 Prop. 18 (which included the species considered in proposal CoP19 Prop. 17), as accepted by Committee I, was adopted.

The Conference of the Parties noted that **proposal CoP19 Prop. 21** had been withdrawn.

Proposal CoP19 Prop. 37, as amended to add an annotation stating “the entry into effect in the inclusion in Appendix II delayed by 12 months”, as accepted by Committee I following a vote, was adopted. Japan asked that the following statement be included in the record regarding proposal CoP19 Prop. 37:

The inclusion of blue shark as a look-alike species in Appendix II is completely unreasonable and unscientific. Around 100,000 tons of blue shark are sustainably harvested annually in more than 60 countries worldwide. In other words, blue shark is not a threatened or endangered species, but a fishery target species that can be sustainably used. Blue shark is an important commercially exploited aquatic species; local economy and livelihoods depend upon it. Therefore, Japan is deeply concerned that proposal CoP19 Prop. 37 could cause harmful socio-economic impacts such as threatening food security and sustainable fisheries development.

Brazil requested to re-open the debate on **proposal CoP19 Prop. 41**, which had been rejected by Committee I after a vote. With 83 Parties in favour, 21 against and 31 abstentions, the debate was reopened, Brazil proposed an amendment to proposal CoP19 Prop. 41 to include *Hypancistrus zebra* in Appendix II with a zero quota for wild specimens for commercial purposes. Argentina, Chile, Congo, Guatemala, India, Indonesia, Israel, Malaysia, Mali, Mexico, Peru, Senegal, Suriname and Uruguay supported the proposal as amended. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 41 as amended was adopted by consensus.

The Chair of Committee I reported that **proposals CoP19 Prop. 42 (Rev. 1), Prop. 44 and Prop. 48** had been accepted by the Committee after having been amended and following votes. Proposal CoP19 Prop.

42 (Rev. 1) to include the genus *Thelenota* in Appendix II with the entry into effect of the inclusion in Appendix II delayed by 18 months was adopted. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 44 to include genera *Handroanthus*, *Roseodendron* and *Tabebuia* in Appendix II with annotation #17 and with the entry into effect of the inclusion in Appendix II delayed by 24 months was adopted. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 48 to include *Dipteryx* spp. in Appendix II, with an annotation stating 'Logs, sawn wood, veneer sheets, plywood and transformed wood', with the entry into effect of the inclusion in Appendix II delayed by 24 months, was adopted.

Proposal CoP19 Prop. 47 had been rejected by Committee I, after an amended version of this proposal had been rejected following a vote with 30 Parties in favour, 55 against and 9 abstentions. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 47 was rejected.

Proposals CoP19 Prop. 49 and Prop. 52 had been accepted by consensus by Committee I after having been amended. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 49 to maintain *Paubrasilia echinata* in Appendix II with an amended annotation, as recorded in document CoP19 Com. I.6, was adopted. Proposal CoP19 Prop. 52 to amend annotation #4, as recorded in summary record CoP19 Com. I Rec. 14, had been accepted by consensus by Committee I and was adopted as amended. Five draft decisions in connection with Proposal CoP19 Prop. 49, contained in document CoP19 Com. I.6, and four draft decisions in connection with Proposal CoP19 Prop. 52, contained in document CoP19 Com. I Rec. 14, were adopted.

Administrative and financial matters

4. Rules of the Procedure of the Conference of the Parties

4.1 Report of the Standing Committee

This item had been introduced in the first meeting of the plenary, at which amendments to Rule 7.2 and Rule 25.5 proposed in document CoP19 Doc. 4.1 were adopted, and a conclusion on proposed amendments to Rule 25.6 in the same document had been deferred. The plenary addressed the proposed amendments to Rule 25.6 in the document. These were introduced by the Chair of the Standing Committee, who explained that there were four proposed changes to this rule. The three substantive amendments to Rule 25.6 contained in Annex 1 to document CoP19 Doc. 4.1 and a fourth consequential amendment in the first sentence of Rule 25.6. The consequential amendment, to replace “, and proposals made” with “or” after “Rule 24, paragraph 2” in the first sentence of Rule 25.6, was a result of the amendment that had already been agreed to Rule 25.5 and it was hoped therefore that this could be agreed by consensus. The Chair of the Standing Committee suggested that the plenary consider each proposed amendment to Rule 25.6 in turn.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo, speaking also on behalf of 44 other Parties, echoed by India, strongly opposed the proposed amendments to Rule 25.6 particularly the one that would replace the word “least” with most where it occurs in the second sentence. It noted that, in the spirit of compromise, the 45 parties were prepared to accept the replacement of “, and proposals made” with “or” after “Rule 24, paragraph 2” in the first sentence in Rule 25.6. Argentina, China, Japan, and Peru supported the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The European Union and its Member States, Israel, Senegal and the United States of the America supported the proposed amendments to Rule 25.6. The European Union and its Member States indicated that given the opposition to the proposed amendments they were willing to explore practical ways to progress the issue.

The Chair noted that there was consensus to replace ~~“, and proposals made~~ with or after “Rule 24, paragraph 2” in Rule 25.6, and this proposed change was adopted. She asked the Parties to consider the other proposed amendments.

Canada highlighted the importance of consensus in relation to the Rules of Procedure and acknowledged that there was a difference of views among the Parties. It suggested revising Decision 18.1 to direct the Standing Committee to hold further discussions on Rule 25.6 in the intersessional period. Canada suggested text for the revision of the Decision as follows:

18.1 (Rev. CoP19) With the support of the Secretariat, the Standing Committee shall review ~~Rule 7.2 a) and Rule 25.6~~ of the Rules of Procedure of the Conference of the Parties and propose amendments, as appropriate, to the ~~49~~⁴⁹²⁰th meeting of the Conference of the Parties with the view to ensuring the effective conduct of meetings.

The Chair recommended the adoption of the revised decision, and this was supported by China and the United States. Indonesia suggested that it would be helpful to have more time to consult on the proposed changes. Israel was concerned that adopting Canada's proposal would mean that the Conference of the Parties would face the same issues at its 20th meeting and suggested accepting the revisions to Rule 25.6 at this meeting, with the exception of the replacement of the word "least" with "most". China proposed the text of a new draft decision directed to the Secretariat, and the Chair indicated that this proposal should be made in the Standing Committee.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo suggested that, as there was no consensus, the proposal to amend Rule 25.6 should be put to a vote. Mexico and the United States sought clarification on the aspects of the proposed amendments to Rule 25.6 that would be subject to a vote. In response to Indonesia's repeated call for time for more consultations, the Chair pointed out that this had been the intent of the proposal to refer the matter to the Standing Committee for further discussion. In light of this, and recognizing that consultations were still needed, the Democratic Republic of the Congo withdrew its request for a vote.

The Chair asked the Parties to accept Canada's proposal to revise Decision 18.1, and this was adopted.

4.2 Proposed amendment to Rule 26

The Chair recalled that this agenda item had been discussed in the first meeting of the Plenary and had been deferred. Zimbabwe, one of the proponents of document CoP19 Doc. 4.2, indicated that it would consult further on this item with a view to further discussion at the next meeting of the Conference of the Parties. It was agreed to close debate on this agenda item.

90. Determination of the time and venue of the next regular meeting of the Conference of the Parties

The Secretariat indicated that it had not yet been informed of any offers to host the next regular meeting of the Conference of the Parties, noting that the next meeting would be held in 2025.

91. Concluding remarks

Ukraine stated that the unprovoked and unjustified full-scale invasion of the Russian Federation into Ukraine had destroyed habitats for thousands of species of wild fauna and flora, this having a negative impact on Ukraine's effective implementation of the Convention. Ukraine expressed an interest in hosting a future CITES meeting. Their intervention was supported by the European Union and its Member States, the United States of America, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and New Zealand. The Russian Federation stated that they opposed the politicization of all environmental instruments and strongly rejected the false accusation made by Ukraine and others in violation of international law. The Russian Federation reaffirmed its commitment to CITES and its full implementation.

Closing remarks were made by representatives of non-governmental organizations, intergovernmental organizations, observing States and Parties, all expressing their appreciation for the Host Country, the Chairs of the Committees, the Secretariat, interpreters, translators and rapporteurs, and all others who had worked hard to make the meeting such a success. Her Excellency Ms. Janaina Tewaney Mencomo, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Panama expressed how proud her country had been to host CoP19, highlighting the importance of the decisions taken during that meeting for biodiversity.

Mr. Carlos Manuel Rodríguez, CEO and Chairperson of the Global Environment Facility (GEF) highlighted the strategic importance of the GEF for the implementation of the Convention and called on Parties to work with their GEF national focal points to access its funding. The Secretary-General thanked all delegates and participants for contributing to a successful meeting, and reflected on the importance of the outcomes of the meeting in contributing to conservation and ensuring international trade in wildlife is sustainable, legal and traceable. She thanked the host country for hosting an outstanding meeting.

His Excellency Mr. Milciades Concepción declared the 19th meeting of the Conference of the Parties closed.

The meeting closed at 14h20.
