

CUSTOMS CONTROL OF TRADE IN CITES LISTED SPECIES

TRENDS, TECHNOLOGIES AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR IMPROVED TRADE AND REGULATORY CONTROL

Background

The Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) establishes a legally binding regulatory regime to ensure the survival of CITES-listed species in the wild, providing opportunities for sustainable trade and economic development, in particular in developing countries and for local communities. Currently, 183 States are Party to this Convention and bound to its rules (182 countries and the European Union).

CITES regulates trade in over 36,000 species of wild animals and plants, both aquatic and terrestrial, including emblematic species such as tigers, elephants, rhinos, manta rays and great apes. The core instrument for regulating trade is a system of permits and certificates issued and controlled by a national CITES Management Authority, which has been officially appointed by the Government. The CITES permit or certificate documents the legality and sustainability of trade and is reported annually to the Secretariat. It is the core instrument to distinguish between legal and illegal trade in wildlife.

Customs Authorities have a crucial role in the effective implementation and enforcement of the Convention as the control the cross border movements of goods. The CITES permit is a supporting document that is added to the customs import or export declaration. The Customs import and export clearing system and process is the principal filtering mechanism to assess the legitimacy of the trade transaction and to detect incidents of illegal trade.

To facilitate and control global trade a number of advanced concepts have been developed by the World Customs Organization (WCO) and other international organizations such as Revised Kyoto Convention, the WCO Framework of Standards to Secure and Facilitate Global Trade (WCO SAFE Framework of Standards), automated risk management, Coordinated Border Management, Trade Facilitation standards such as Single Window data models and the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement, to name some of them. In addition, Customs Authorities worldwide are using highly automated and computerized systems for the control of the border clearance processes.

It is therefore extremely important for CITES decision makers to fully understand latest approaches, technologies and agreements in the Customs trade control systems and to ensure that CITES Management Authorities can collaborate with Customs Authorities to fully exploit the potential of trade control and facilitation systems.

Understanding of Customs control and clearance procedures is of particular importance for Management Authorities that plan to implement and enhance electronic CITES Management Systems (eCITES) as these systems need to interact on the technical and on the organizational level with the Customs Authorities and Customs IT Management Systems to ensure that the concerns of trade in CITES listed species are fully taken into account in the Customs clearance process.

About the workshop

The purpose of the workshop is to foster the collaboration between the CITES Management Authorities and the Customs Authorities for improved control of trade in wildlife.

The workshop promotes a common approach of the CITES Management Authorities and Customs Authorities, based on modern and automated trade procedures and Customs clearance processes in line with the requirements of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement which came into force recently.

Participants will be familiarised with the specific integrated Customs border controls, automated and simplified procedures, new technologies and their use do to improve the controls for trade in CITES listed species, in particular with regard to electronic information management and exchange.

The workshop will focus on the following main subjects:

- a) Trends and policy agendas in the Customs environment;
- b) Coordinated border controls International recommendations and best practice
- c) Automated and simplified border control procedures;
- d) Risk-management systems and targeted inspections;
- e) CITES-related Customs clearance procedures in practice;
- f) Collaboration of Customs with other Government agencies (organizational and technical aspects); Single Window, platform for efficient import and export control procedures;
- g) Known obstacles for CITES integration into Customs control: HS nomenclature vs. CITES nomenclature; Definition and integration of CITES related non-tariff measures;
- h) Automation of the CITES permit process;
- i) ASYCUDA solution for electronic CITES permit management (ACITES)

This Workshop will also supports CITES work to ensure that the CITES Resolutions and Decisions are consistent with the electronic border clearance processes, that the joint work with UNCTAD on the development of an electronic CITES solution, organised under the MoU between UNCTAD and CITES Secretariat, and that the Secretariat support to Parties in the implementation of electronic CITES solutions (CoP Decision 17.158 b, Decision 17.157 c and Decision 17.159 c).


